# 2020 PIT Count

## Point-In-Time Count

- Date: Tuesday, January 28, 2020
- Statewide count
- Multiple agencies & volunteers working together



# PIT Count Results

- Notable differences in the characteristics between West & East South Dakota
- Increase total homelessness (6%) statewide
- Chronic Homeless substantially higher
- Reduction Veteran Homelessness
- Increased persons counted DV projects

# PIT Count Discussion

- Adequate housing in tribal areas related to “unsheltered Count”
- Mobile App - paper survey
- PIT surveys completed for night of the count
- DV agencies chronic homelessness
- Projects are completing PIT surveys more often
- Learning file



# FY 2019 CoC Competition

- Debrief provides info on scoring
- Review collaborative application & seek improvements
- Complete grant agreement tasks
- Continue performance improvement activities
- HUD may begin 2 year CoC grant cycle

# SPM & HMIS NOFA

## HMIS Bed Inventory FY2019

- 26% Emergency Shelter (ES)
- 7% Transitional Housing (TH)
- 31% Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)
- 100% Other PH (GPD & HOPWA)
- 100% Rapid Rehousing Beds (RRH)
  - DV Beds are not included in info

# SPM

## System Performance Measurements

- HUD analysis tool for CoC performance
- Measures progress
- FY2019; 10/01/18 – 09/30/2019
- Reports data from HMIS
- Submitted to HUD
- Utilized in CoC Competition scoring
- Fiscal Year comparison tool



# SPM - Progress

## SPM Report FY2019

- Progress evident
  - Average length of time (LOT) Homeless
  - Returns to homelessness improved
  - Improvement in total income for system stayers & leavers
  - % of successful exits from all categories improved



# SPM - Goals

## System Performance Measurements Report

- Improvement goals
  - Continue progress evident
  - Decrease percentage returning to homelessness (ES)
  - Increase bed coverage rate
  - Data quality errors below 3% for all categories



# SPM & HMIS NOFA

## HMIS NOFA - Report

- Expand HMIS participation data integration
- Increase HMIS data accuracy - training platform & policy development
- Review HMIS & CoC policies & procedures. Complete revisions comply with HUD standards. Expanding CoC data quality plan to all HMIS projects.



# Youth

## Consortium Homelessness Response

- Foster Youth to Independency Initiative (FYI) – housing voucher program
- Youth Homeless Demonstration Program (YHDP) Application – youth specific funding for housing & services
- Youth Committee
- Youth Advisory Board (YAB)



# Youth Characteristics

## Experiencing Homelessness

- Transitional Age Youth (TAY) 16-24 years
- Can be difficult to serve/locate
- Highly vulnerable population
- Many have foster care history
- Couch surf - move regularly
- 18-24 year PIT category
- Unaccompanied youth & child PIT categories



# FYI Initiative

## Foster Youth to Independency Initiative

- Pennington County Housing participating PHA
- Housing voucher program - foster care experience
- Partnership between PHA, DSS, SDHHC, & service provider (LSS)
- CES & other referral process



# FYI Initiative

- Up to 25 vouchers per year per participating PHA
- 36 months of rental assistance coupled with service options

# YHDP Requirements

- Assess Needs
  - Racial & ethnic minorities
  - LGBTQ+
  - Parenting Youth
  - Youth engaged in foster care & corrections
  - Youth victims of human trafficking
- Include Youth Action Board (YAB)
  - Lived homelessness experiences 2/3
  - 3 member minimum



# YHDP

- Engage Wide variety of stakeholders including
  - YAB
  - Housing providers
  - State child welfare agency
  - School districts
  - Workforce development organizations
  - Juvenile justice system
  - Homelessness Organizations
  - CoC Collaborative Applicant

# Engaging Youth in Your Organization

**Young people are not our future leaders**

**They are our leaders of today!!**

# Adult's Attitudes Can Be Very Repulsive

It would require a policy change?!?

We don't have any opportunities for "kids."

They don't deserve help until they help themselves ...  
"Entitlement Syndrome"

It's more work than it's worth

Adults know what is best for youth.

ADULTS ARE USUALLY THE "ROADBLOCKS"

They only know about youth issues and not about societal issues.

They don't have enough life experience to make important decisions.

We will have them do the stuff we don't want to do.

They can't be trusted!

# You Are Competing Against Heavy Competition!

- School (7:30am – 3:30pm = 40 hr. + 5-7 hr. homework = 45 hr)
- Sports, clubs, extra curricular (5-10 hr. per week)
- Part time job (5-10 hr. per week)
- Time for their family, friends, church, hobbies
- And then . . . Time for your organization

**YOU ARE COMPETING WITH THE NEXT RELATIONSHIP, SPORT, TEST AND/OR PAID JOB.**

# Consider Other Challenges

- Transportation
- Youth transiency
- Adult attitudes
- Lack of care/interest

# WOW Factor Needed

Offer opportunities, not just “volunteering”

Match **interests** to opportunities – be creative

Incentives are powerful tools  
(gift cards, raffles, food, events)

Peer influence is powerful  
(family, neighbors, sports team, church)

When creating opportunities, be sure to take into consideration all age levels.

- Thinking outside of the box
- Insight for further recruitment
- Ambitious volunteers
- A new energy

# Communication is Key

(Recruit, Train, Remind and Praise)

Text reminders  
Zoom



Social Media  
Phone call



Communication with adult mentors

# Recruitment Ideas

- Volunteer Connections – Helpline Center
- Personal invite to young person (grandchild, child, babysitter, neighbor, church)
- National Honor Society
- Student Councils
- Boy Scouts / Girl Scouts
- Churches
- School clubs

# Tips From Youth

- Work alongside of us.
- Don't give us too much leeway. There should be expectations, but be reasonable as we continue to learn.
- Remember that we are individuals and do not represent the voice of all youth.
- Don't interrupt! This will shut us down immediately.
- Ask for our opinions.
- Your role is a partner, not a parent.
- Let us know you value our ideas, insights and service.
- When we make a mistake, let us know (preferably in private).
