



Statewide Overview


South Dakota had **341,565** households in 2018.





Population Below Poverty Line by Race/Ethnicity



ESG Reports

ESG Traditional

- ESG '19 \$607,391. Funds were awarded to 19 agencies across the state and the grant expires May 2021.
- o ESG '20 \$637,969. Funds were awarded to 17 agencies across the state and the grant expires August 2022.
- o ESG '21 \$638,752. Application will be opening this Spring.

ESG CARES Act (ESG-CV)

In order address the COVID-19 pandemic, HUD provided a supplemental allocation of ESG funds under the CARES Act. These funds are to be used to prevent, prepare for and respond to coronavirus among individuals and families who are homeless or receiving homelessness assistance. SD received two allocations of funding totaling \$7,754,851. These funds include waivers and variances to the traditional ESG requirements and activities and includes expenses back to March 13, 2020 when the Governor declared the emergency in SD. All ESG CARES Act funds must be spent by September 30, 2022.



ESG Continued

ESG CARES Act – 2 Allocations

Allocation 1 \$2,199,893 – awarded to 9 agencies across the state June 2020.

The second allocation of funding totals \$5,554,958 and was split into two application rounds.

- o Round 1 \$4,166,218 is a general application round and includes a \$1,000,000 setasside for agencies providing ESG services to tribal communities. This application round closed January 29, 2021. Funds awarded to 12 agencies.
- Round 2 \$1,388,740 was targeted to 3 pilot project areas of Cheyenne River Reservation, Pine Ridge Reservation and within 100 miles of the Pierre area. This application round closed February 26, 2021. Received 3 applications for Pine Ridge Reservation area.





Pathways Shelter for the Homeless CDBG COVID-19 Response Project Location Map


